Sepsis Clinical Care Standard

Bereavement support after sepsis

This leaflet provides information about sepsis and bereavement support. It is written for people who have lost someone because of sepsis.

What is sepsis?

Sepsis arises when the body responds to an infection by damaging its own organs and tissues. Sepsis can cause failure of organs such as the kidneys, lungs, liver and heart, leading to death. People who survive sepsis may lose limbs or have permanent disabilities. Septic shock is the most serious form of sepsis.

Sepsis is a very serious illness that can result in significant injuries or death. It can be a terrible shock if someone close to you dies of sepsis. The illness can move very quickly, and they may have been in good health before it happened. It may be difficult for you to remember what happened, or you might have questions about it. It may help to ask the nurses and doctors about anything you don't understand.

The healthcare service should give you information about what caused the person's death and the treatment provided to them before they died. You should be offered information at the time of the event, as well as the opportunity to ask questions at a later date.

You may find it hard to believe that the person has died, especially if it happened very quickly. Talk to your friends and family and ask for any help you need. It may help you to talk to a bereavement counsellor because they can offer support and understanding to adults and children who have lost a relative or friend.

The healthcare service can give you information about accessing bereavement support, and may involve a social worker to help. You can also talk to your general practitioner and ask for a referral to a bereavement counsellor.

If a formal bereavement service associated with the healthcare service is not available or you wish to use another, see the options listed opposite (please note that no specific service is being recommended, and the choice is yours).
