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




NSW Pasifika population – 131,077 Concentration – across Western Sydney and South Western Sydney

Generational traditions

"What is diabetes" in-language

Diabetes – a chronic metabolic disease

 Condition: blood glucose (sugar) levels are too high, body does not produce enough insulin Ma'i suka – sick caused by too much sugar in the blood

Mahaki suka – sick caused by too much sugar in the blood

Matenisuka – death by sugar too much sugar in the blood

Toto vene – blood

"when you eat too much "Sugar"
