The Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care has published the updated <u>National</u> guidelines for presentation of electronic discharge summaries (the Guidelines).

The Guidelines provide recommendations about the structure, format, and content of electronic discharge summaries, contributing to national consistency. They emphasise the important role of robust clinical governance, training and evaluation processes in achieving accurate, concise, and well-designed electronic discharge summaries.

High-quality and timely discharge summaries are an essential part of effective clinical handover at this high-risk transition.

Notes	Queensland-based vascular access researchers Josie Lovegrove and team recently
	published their study examining whether policy for peripheral intravenous catheters
	matched the standards of care outlined in the Commission's Management of
	Peripheral Intravenous Catheters Clinical Care Standard (the Standard). Binary
	adherence of policy documents was assessed against the Standard's ten quality
	statements. While 13 of 15 policies published after the Standard (2021) referred to it,
	no individual document was adherent to all ten statements - suggesting that significant
	improvements are needed in policy to support adherence to the Standard. A <u>related</u>
	point-prevalence study in 134 hospital wards found that binary adherence to all
	Clinical Care Standard indicators was only met for 20% of patients.

Facemask and Respirator Use for Bushfire Smoke Protection: A Cross-Country Comparison of Public Health Policies in Australia, Canada, India, and the United States

Notes	Paper reporting on an examination of public policies regarding use of facemasks and respirators for bushfire or wildfire smoke in selected nations. Among the findings noted by the authors: 'There is variability in policies regarding mask and respirator use during bushfires. Health departments generally recommend using P2/N95 respirators to protect the public from particulate exposure arising bushfire smoke, while emergency and fire services generally recommend surgical or cloth masks. Few guidelines provided detailed instructions on the proper use of respirators, including fit testing, or fit checking procedures. Most guidelines emphasised monitoring air quality and avoiding bushfire smoke, particularly for high-risk groups. There is no guidance provided on the length of time a mask should be used in any guideline.'



What else can you do to stop the spread of infections?

- Always change gloves and perform hand hygiene between different care activities and when gloves become soiled to prevent cross contamination of body sites


